It's Time for Poetry & Cookies!

Be inspired by an afternoon of poetry at the Altadena Main Library and meet the District's new Poet Laureate! Find joy and inspiration at the Altadena Library on Sunday, April 29, from 1:00 - 4:30pm (with a break from 2:30 to 3:00) when it hosts one of the largest local poetry readings in our community. This event celebrates the formal launch of the Altadena Poetry Review: Anthology 2017 (published by the award-winning local indie, Golden Foothills Press). Also on the docket is the inauguration of the library's new Poet Laureate 2018-2020. The 104 poets included in this publication, many of whom will be reading that day, are Pushcart Prize Nominees, Poets Laureate, writing teachers, editors, publishers, professors, and emerging authors. The 167 poems in the anthology are multi-culturally diverse and represent a broad variety of styles: traditional, unrhymed, short, long, humorous, poignant, political, inspirational, experimental, and, "everything in between."

The creation of this book was led by co-editors: Elline Lipkin, Poet Laureate of the Altadena

The co-editors worked closely with a peer review panel of published poets and editors who discussed all submitted poems. The Anthology Selection Committee, all volunteers, include Tim Callahan, Gloriana Casey, Gerda Govine Ituarrte, Briony James, Elsa M. J. Seifert, Mary Fitzpatrick, and Cathie Sandstrom.

Libraries Lead. Celebrate National Library Week 2018!



If we have learned one thing through our work over the last year, it is that a local library has the power to be a leader in the community. In an unincorporated community like Altadena that does not have a central government structure, our Library has a unique opportunity to work both independently and in collaboration with groups like the Altadena Town Council and other local organizations to bolster community progress.

It has been the intention of the Library to help lead Altadena toward an attitude of community engagement and service. After our initial round of Community Conversations in early 2017, we experienced an inspiring renewal of effort within the Library to incorporate the needs of the community directly into our available programming and resources (see more on page 3). We hoped that our efforts would inspire other community groups to also approach the new year with renewed commitment to progress, and whether or not it had to do with the Community Conversations, it is undeniable that Altadena has experienced a resurgence of community involvement and action throughout the year.

We are proud of our community and our Library District, and we are honored to celebrate our special place in Altadena, This year, National Library Week takes place the week of Sunday, April 8th through Saturday, April 14th. It is a time we use to celebrate the contributions of our nation's libraries and librarians and to promote library use and support. This long-standing tradition is celebrated every year across the country and stems from a real need.

In the mid-1950s, research showed that Americans were spending less on books and more on radios, televisions and musical instruments. Concerned that Americans were

reading less, the American Library Association (ALA) and the American Book Publishers formed a nonprofit citizens organization called the National Book Comittee in 1954. The committee's goals were ambitious. They ranged from "encouraging people to read in their increasing leisure time" to "improving incomes and health" and "developing strong and happy family life."

In 1957, the committee developed a plan for National Library Week based on the idea that once people were motivated to read, they would support and use libraries. With the cooperation of ALA and help from the Advertising Council, the first National Library Week was observed in 1958 with the theme "Wake Up and Read!" When the National Book Committee disbanded in 1974, ALA assumed full sponsorship. and National Library Week continues annually to celebrate libraries across the country.


cherishing and preserving the things it has always done best."





Furry Friends Build Readers

It's never easy to master a new skill. To get good at anything requires a good teacher, practice, patience, and—maybe most importantly—a safe space to try and fail, and then try again.

A safe space is essential for kids learning to read, especially for those who are particularly shy or struggling. Reading Therapy Dogs are a great audience for early readers. They provide a non-judgmental and patient ear for kids who might otherwise be too shy or embarrassed to practice reading aloud.

Our Library has two opportunities for independent readers to practice their fluency and develop their confidence in reading. On the First Saturday of each month, Cedar the Dog leads our Tail Waggin' Tutors event, and on the fourth Wednesday of the month. the Pasadena Humane Society comes by with some good boys and girls for Barks & Books (see dates on page 6). At each event, students will have the chance to read a book or two aloud to a furry friend.

Those who wish to participate should be able to read independently, and should probably not be afraid of dogs. Our four-legged therapists also request that readers be skilled belly-rubbers and ear-scratchers.
