the best nectar sources for pollinators and general garden necessities for the support of monarch habitats as well as resources for creating home and public pollinator habitats.

Women's History in Libraries

Libraries have existed in various forms in America dating back to when Benjamin Franklin founded the first American membership library in 1731 and later the nation's first public library in 1790. In the early years, it was men from New England's elite, like Franklin, that drove the early library movement, with women from families of similar status volunteering at libraries, typically within the children's programs. A gradual shift occurred, however, when the American Library Assocation was formed in 1876 by a group of 103 librarians (90 men and 13 women). One of those women, Mary Cutler Fairchild, performed a research study that described the trend in many libraries of men in directorial positions, with women running operations, often times greatly outnumbering men. Library education became more readily available for women and men with many programs made available in libraries staffed primarily by women. By the turn of the century, librarianship was a sought-after profession for middle- and working-class women, offering an opportunity for public service as well as a chance at adventure for those willing to go West.

The American Library Association elected its first female president in 1911, and from there the numbers shifted dramatically. While in the 1880s men made up 52% of the 636 librarians in the U.S., by 1930, men made up only 8% of librarians.

The Altadena Library District also has women to thank for much of its growth. The first Altadena library was formed in 1908 as a mere bookshelf and bushell of books in a local school house. It was the Woman's Circle of Altadena that created the first adult library in Altadena as a branch of the Los Angeles County Library, housed in the kindergarten room of Calaveras Street School. As we look back on how far our District has come since its early days, we remember and thank the women that had the vision to expand the Library's materials and services beyond a bookshelf to reach even more of our community.



"I paint with acrylic paint. I draw with ink. I work from imagination and memory. Most of my work gives a view of people.






I also have an affinity for animals. I become the choreographer leading the eye of the viewer into the performance of the art."






